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Web 2.0 Tools and Professional Parameters

The literature supports the importance of using technology in all the domains of nursing such as education, practice, and administration. Slowly, the utilization of Web 2.0 tools is being seen in nursing education through the introduction of wikis, blogs, and podcasts in the classroom for educational purposes. Also, websites such as the national portal, NurseOne, are also beginning to be used for classroom purposes by a select group of educators. However, as stated previous research suggests that with an emerging generation of young bloggers, instant messengers and social networkers, education must begin to focus on the utilization of Web 2.0 tools in the classroom in order to stimulate the minds of these "digital natives".

Many educational institutions have begun using technology and its tools to deliver classroom content and have reported great success among their students. This includes broader knowledge base of material due to the desire to partake in social networking discussions, a willingness to take responsibility for their own learning, and lastly, enjoyment to learn classroom content.

Nursing education would benefit greatly from the utilization of technology, particularly social networking software, in classrooms because it would link students to senior staff that could answer questions on a variety of topics from pathophysiology to advocacy in client care. T
